Don Lain 1929-2011



Don obtained a degree in Engineering and worked in that field. When he was 40, he wanted a change of direction and completed a post-graduate course in teaching. He taught Maths and Science in Bedford School, and quickly rose to be Head of Department.

Taking retirement at the age of 61, he travelled the world with his wife Eve.

In June 1996 they both moved to Santon Downham. Eve describes it as 15 very happy years.

Our thoughts are with Eve, his wife, and their son, daughters and grandchildren.

Spotlight on...

One of the village characters that we must look at is Edie Turner. Sadly, she is no longer with us, but memories of this character live on. Many villagers have stories about Edie, not all suitable for publication. The house where she used to live has now become part of my home. Her memory lives on with us, as we still refer to 'Edie's lounge' and 'Edie's garden'. Ed. (Thanks to many, especially Wink Turner and Ronnie Moran.)

Edie Turner was the village character, the likes of which we are unlikely to see again. Anyone living in the village from the 1930s through to the end of the 20th century would have known Edie.

Early life

Edie's family did not start in Santon Downham. Originally an Elveden family, they lived in Lynford for several years, where father worked in the forest. Born about 1915, she was the last of 16 children. She was very small as a baby and wasn't expected to survive long - but she did. Her mother called her the 'runt' and carried her around on a cushion in her early days. She was put in a cardboard box to sleep. As an adult, she was only about four foot six in height.

Santon Downham residents

The family moved to Santon Downham in the early 1920s, living in part of Woodcock Cottage (now combined with the other half as my residence). By now, there were only four children living with the parents, a couple having died and the others having left home. Brothers Sid, Tom and Bert shared the house with Edie and their parents.

She had very little schooling, her mother keeping her home to help. Edie says that she went to school in Brandon, being taken there in a horse and cart. She was illiterate for the rest of her life, but that did not stop her communicating with other villagers.

As a child in the village, she remembers playing

in the old Downham Hall, before Forestry took it over and demolished it.

She seems to have had a couple of jobs, the first one when she was 21. This was selling papers in Brandon station as people got on and off the trains. Later, she had a baking job at Lakenheath.

An interesting life

There are numerous stories about Edie and her life

in the village. She used to go into Brandon regularly, in the early days, cycling on an oversized bike. She did like the odd 'sherry'! Apparently, cycling back on the large bike after the odd bevy was something to be seen. In later years, without the bike, she frequently had to be brought home. She was said to be an excellent morel (a type of edible toadstool) finder, keeping their location a secret, and pickling them for her own use and for selling.

For a while, she enjoyed going to WI meetings where she made pastries. Most of all, she enjoyed a good sing-song. Having had her as a neighbour for several years, I can vouch for her good singing voice as she would join in with 'Songs of Praise', knowing all the words and being audible through 18 inch walls.

For much of her life, she kept pets. One cat followed another, and they were all called *Jonny*. It was Ron Hoblyn's task to bury the dead ones in her garden.

But it was the dogs that people remember. Toby was notorious, and seems to have terrorised half of the village. He was followed by Henry who tried to imitate his predecessor but was too fat and merely barked at everyone.

She stayed single all of her life, although she maintains that she enjoyed the war when the American soldiers were over here. We won't pursue that any further!

I knew her for the last few years, before she moved into a home. I was greeted everyday by this diminutive character, with a raised walking stick and an unlit cigarette in her mouth.

She was in her late 80s when she died, 76 years of which were in Woodcock Cottage. For Someone with a difficult start, she led a full and interesting life. *Derek Toomer, Ed.*
